	•	Drusillas has public liability insurance of £10,000,000
	•	Anyone with a serious phobia should advise the education staff before an animal handling session.
	•	Those with asthma or allergies may wish to exclude themselves from close contact with the animals. Please be aware that some of the animals are fed nuts and this may affect those with a severe nut allergy. We advise that teachers / group leaders inform education staff of nut allergies when bookings are made.
	•	Pregnant women, the immuno-suppressed and the chronically ill should refrain from animal contact.
	•	Children should be supervised by an adult at all times.
	•	Please do not climb on the animal enclosures or bang on the glass as this may frighten or upset the animals.
	•	Please do not feed the animals.

Education sessions and Covid

Are all education sessions being offered?

- Yes, we are currently offering our full range of sessions, including dressing up, artefact handling, and meeting animals' elements.
- Invertebrates can be harmed by hand sanitiser and so they have largely only been viewed (not stroked) for the last two years. We are starting to reintroduce cockroach stroking.

Can animals carry or suffer from Covid-19?

• There is evidence that some species can carry Covid, but this is rare in 'pet-type' species and Drusillas animals' health is continually monitored.

Education officers.

• Education officers are both double vaccinated and boosted. Have recently stopped automatically wearing masks in close contact situations but can do on request.

Different schools visiting

• Multiple schools often visit on a day (especially in Term 6), and the same items may be used by more than one group.

Air conditioning and ventilation

- Drusillas air conditioning is limited to the rooms that it is in (recycles the classroom air, doesn't spread through building) so will be used as necessary to maintain level of comfort.
- Rainforest Room has windows that can be kept open (is a smaller room, more constrained space). The Discovery Centre does not have windows but is a larger space.

Changes to bookings

• Bookings may have to be adjusted to follow government advice. Bookings are made without any financial obligation and can be cancelled or changed by the school at any stage. If Drusillas education officers are asked to isolate, then sessions will need to be cancelled.
